

Have you ever wondered how the Leader Magazine is produced each month, and who its columnists are?

Almost every **Leader** article begins with a very happy section Scouter experiencing a successful evening program. Terry Nail from Calgary, AB, is a good example. He sent in a story about a wild west program for Beavers that his members enjoyed as an all-day event. Recognizing a great theme, we edited his words, making sure leaders only had to read the article to know exactly how to duplicate Terry's success. (Terry told us precisely how to play all the games, and make all the crafts.) The result was a terrific three-page program article.

Sometimes a number of Scouters send us programs covering similar themes, but for different sections. We combine several articles into one large piece so as many children as possible benefit. Of course, each writer receives full credit in **the Leader** for his or her submission.

If a leader sends a brief write-up that sounds interesting, we'll either ask for more details, or publish it "as is" in the *Swap Shop* column. We look for every opportunity to publish *your* submissions, though it might take a year or more to find the perfect place.

Because **the Leader** doesn't have staff photographers, we depend on Scouters like you to mail us pictures. Why not package up and send us your best ones right now?

Frequent Contributors

Over the past year you've probably noticed several Scouters' names appearing frequently in by-lines. These section leaders send us a steady stream of their best ideas.

Hazel Hallgren (Red Deer, AB) has been a Beaver leader since the mid-1970s. About every four months she sends in a box with all of her best program material included, with a full explanation of each game, craft, theme and other specific activity. You've read about many of her terrific programs.

Colin Wallace (Scarborough, ON) became a Cub in Scotland. Later, he joined Scouts and Rovers. His creative imagination and fun-loving approach to life make him an outstanding contributor. Last year he wrote an off-the-ground feature, a trivia article, and several others.

Guy Mandeville, a Scouter from Trenton, ON, sends in a lot of material each year, often dealing with Aboriginal subjects. In addition to a feature piece this past year, Guy authored many submissions for the Scouter's Five section of the magazine.

Lauri Cunningham used to co-write the *Bridge the Gap* column with Bryon Milliere. Now she writes it herself. She was an Akela in Thornhill, ON, before moving to Ottawa as a trainer.
