

Anyone for Camping?

As you plan summer camping activities with your group, consider using a Scouts Canada camp you have never visited before. Below is an overview of camps across the country, from information submitted to us by local councils. Note that while this list does not cover all camps, you can visit council web sites and find camps operated by each council. Several camps offer year round activities and facilities, so keep the list for reference when you start planning for next season. This list is by province in alphabetical order. Use the contact information provided to make enquiries and reservations.

Alberta

Chinook Council offers a variety of outdoor programs for all sections at its camps. There are programs for every season including a four day winter camping adventure at Camp Impeesa in February. Contact the Administration Centre for more information and bookings.

Camp Apistotoke is a year round camp in Elkwater Provincial Park. Suitable for Beavers, Cubs and Scouts. Canoeing, hiking, beach activities, downhill and cross-country skiing are all available. Groups can also use the park's interpretive programs. This facility can house about 42 people in three heated cabins. Campsites are also available. Dining area seats 75. Shower and washrooms heated year round.

Camp Gardner (30 km west of Calgary) offers an extensive nature program, including an interpretive center, for all sections. Family programs and theme weekends are available. The camp has a swimming pool, obstacle course, archery range, snowshoeing, skating and other program facilities. Meals can be catered or cook your own. The camp offers tenting, cabins, bunkhouses and motel style accommodations.

Camp Impeesa is a three-season facility geared to Scouts, Venturers, and Rovers. Located 36 km southwest of Pincher Creek, it offers high adventure activities like rock climbing, mountain biking, rappelling and spelunking. The camp also contains an obstacle course and zip line, archery, GPS geo-cache, and canoeing. There are tent sites, cabins, and a family program area. Timber Trails is a Scout, Venturer, Rover and Extreme Adventure program based in the Rocky Mountains 250 km northwest of Calgary. Experience trail riding, exploring, hiking, fishing and much more.

Ernest Poole Scout Camp, a wilderness camp 75 km west of Edmonton, offers full time staff, flush toilets and showers, sailboats, boats and sports equipment with site rental. Some winterized facilities are available. Self-contained groups plan their own programs. Sailboating, canoeing, archery, hiking, family camping and cross-country skiing are popular at this site.

Skeleton Lake Scout Camp, 160 km north-east of Edmonton, features four kitchen/dining buildings. Bunkhouses accommodate up to 42 people each. Other features include flush toilets, drinking water and two furnished cabins with bunk beds accommodating up to 10 people each, chapel, activity building, marquee, campfire circle, firewood, beaches, hiking trails and facilities for family camping. Some buildings are suitable for winter use. An extensive wilderness area is available. Program/supervisory staff – May through September. Self-contained groups plan their own programs. Canoes, sailboats, kayaks, archery and field sports equipment are available. A golf course is adjacent to the camp.

Camp Woods is located less than two hours from Banff and Jasper National Parks and features four villages with year round lodges. Semi-wilderness camping, family camping and some un-serviced RV lots on a 105-acre site. Enjoy the waterfront with sailboats and canoes. Obstacle course, orienteering, pioneering, rappelling, nature study and swimming are available on the site.

Camp Barnard is minutes away from Sooke and 27 km from Victoria. The facility has 300 acres of wilderness and developed camping potential. Suitable for year round use. Contact the Camp Ranger at (250) 642-5924.

Camp Caillet is just 15 minutes away from Nanaimo and has access to a hiking trail. Facilities include two sleep cabins, six tent shelters each accommodating six people, a group camping area, covered dining shelter seating 20 and a fully equipped kitchen. Running water is on site but no indoor washroom facilities. There are outhouses on site. Contact Jari Scott at (250) 756-3140.

Camp Gilwell in the Comox Valley offers snowboarding, downhill and cross-country ski runs in winter, hiking and mountain bike trails in the summer. The facilities include four sleep cabins accommodating 48. An A-frame dining room with full kitchen facilities seats 35 and has sleeping accommodation for three. All buildings have electricity. Outhouses are on site. No indoor washroom facilities. Contact Derek Amos at (250) 334-2623.

Camp Nassichuk is located along a creek 30 minutes south of Powell River on a logging road. Facilities include a dining pavilion with seating for 50, two propane and one wood cook stove, hot and cold running water. There is a washhouse with two washrooms. A total of ten sleeping shelters accommodate 4-6 people each. In addition there is a chapel site, campfire pit, sports field and tenting sites. Contact Janet Palen at (604) 485-7652.

Marble Bay Camp on Lake Cowichan between Lake Cowichan Village and Youbou is a wilderness camp offering tenting sites and a cookhouse. Pumped water and outhouses are on site. The camp has access to hiking trails and canoes are available. Contact Jane Casey at (250) 749-6954.

Camp Boyle – 13 km west of Summerland. A 120-acre wilderness camp. Facilities include two heated cabins for approximately 50, large meet-

ing lodge and kitchen. Lots of tenting areas are available. Contact Greta Rae at (250) 492-8937.

Camp Dunlop is located on Okanagan Lake just south of Kelowna. A large lodge, showers and tenting areas are available. This site can handle up to about 100 campers. Contact Jim Cronin: Tel. (250) 764-7646, Fax. (250) 764-4978; email: info@campdunlop.com.

Hydraulic Lake Wilderness Cabins – The three cabins are located on Hydraulic Lake 48 km from Kelowna and offer accommodation for a total of approximately 30 people. Can be accessed by vehicle in the summer, in winter by foot or snowmobile. Water supply is from the lake and must be boiled, treated or filtered. Pear Lake Wilderness Cabin – located on Pear Lake 48 km from Kelowna. The cabin sleeps a maximum of 14 and is heated by a wood stove and wood cooking range. Can be accessed by vehicle in the summer. In winter by foot or snowmobile. Water supply is from the lake and must be boiled, treated or filtered. Contact Jim Smith at (250) 763-2752, email: cabins@campdunlop.com.

Camp Alloway (180 km. from Winnipeg). A 40.5 hectare wilderness site in the Big Whiteshell Provincial Park, normally accessible by user's own watercraft from mid-May to mid-October, by snow vehicles, skis, snowshoes or foot across the lake (about 3 km) during freeze-up (normally mid-December to mid-March), or by hiking around Big Whiteshell Lake (about 15 km over rough trail). Aside from a large boathouse for equipment storage and emergency shelter, eight canoes with paddles and life jackets (stored in the boat-house), and one outhouse, there are no facilities. Water is taken from the lake and treated. Suitable for experienced Scouts, Venturers and Rovers only.

Camp Amisk (5 km south of Winnipeg). On the La Salle River, includes five bush and six field campsites suitable for groups of all sizes for tent camping. Fire pits and outhouses are provided. Drinking water is available only in spring, summer and fall. There are two buildings on site, a doughnut shelter with fire ring and a storage shed (containing tables, benches and some program equipment). Two kitchen shelters and an emergency telephone are available.

Delta Beach (24 km north of Portage La Prairie) Located on the south shore of Lake Manitoba. Facilities include a fully-contained, winterized, rustic cabin suitable for the use of all sections. There is an internal holding tank, which supplies drinking water for the kitchen sink and the washrooms with flush toilet and basin. Lake water is safe for swimming, laundry and dishes. There are three small rooms with one bunk (two beds) each, and 5 bunks (10 beds) in a larger room (also suitable for a craft/games area), for a total sleeping capacity of 16 (though more can be slept on the floor of the larger room). The kitchen/dining area contains a freezer, two fridges, and a built-in oven and 4-element stove, plus tables and chairs/benches. There are also currently two marked tenting sites, an outhouse and a fire ring.

George Lake (12 km south east of Pointe du Bois). A 60 hectare wilderness campsite on George Lake in the Whiteshell Provincial Park and accessible only by boat or canoe down the Win-

nipeg River followed by a 4 km portage into camp. A single, uninsulated cabin is on-site containing a fireplace, cook stove, some cooking equipment and bunk bed frames that provides sleeping accommodation for 15-20 people. A pit-type outhouse is provided. Drinking water is taken from George Lake. This camp is mainly used by Scouts, Venturers and Rovers.

Camp Ashanti: Located on Route 460 at Black Duck near Stephenville and the Port aux Port Peninsula. The camp has electrical power and several cabins, a cookhouse and tenting sites. This is a local group site and no programs are provided. The camp is about three hours from the ferry at Port aux Basques. Contact the Administrative Centre for details.

Camp Hancock: Located near Square Pond Park, about 25 minutes east of Gander, 200 metres off the Trans Canada Highway. This site offers a modern cookhouse and separate sleeping facilities; there is electrical power on site. For more information visit the council web site, click on Campsites and then Camp Hancock.

Camp Norwest: Located on North West Pond on the Eastern Boundary of Terra Nova National Park, 6.8 km off the Trans Canada Highway. This wilderness site has excellent waterfront facilities for canoeing and swimming and lots of interesting program opportunities for campers. The camp has been the home of the last two provincial jamborees and numerous Cuborees and other camps. The site is operated as a summer facility from late May to Labour Day. Contact the Administrative Centre for bookings.

Carol Scout Lodge, Labrador City: Located in the heart of Labrador City this lodge consists of a large auditorium and kitchen. It is ideal for a stopover as you wind your way along Route 500 in Labrador. Contact information is available through the Administrative Centre.

Camp Nedooae: The Provincial Training Camp is located on 225 acres of wooded and open field property approximately 100 km from Halifax. Accommodation is available in cabins sleeping 40 people. The camp borders on a freshwater lake suitable for swimming and other water activities. The dining hall seats approximately 40;

washrooms are attached. The provincial campsite can be made available to visitors, but there are very limited support services and campers are basically on their own. Contact the Administrative Centre for bookings.

Camp Charl'Bro is a 7 acre, four season camp with 700 feet of shore frontage on Georgian Bay, 30 minutes from Owen Sound. Facilities include four electrically heated cabins with bunks for 38, a heated lodge/cookhouse with a fully equipped kitchen, a craft cabin, modern washrooms, an outdoor chapel and a campfire site. The camp also includes a separate tenting area, which will accommodate up to 30 campers. Hot and cold water is provided April to November. Portable toilets are available November to April. Within a half hour drive are many outdoor activities such as: canoeing on the Rankin and Saugeen Canoe Routes, hiking on the Bruce Trail, scuba diving on Colpoys Bay and Fathom Five National Park, kayaking and sailing on Georgian Bay, fishing, snorkeling, swimming, cross country skiing and snowmobiling. Camp Everton (40 km from Kitchener). A 74 ha camp located on the Eramosa River near Guelph, open all year, six cabins accommodating up to 30 youth, 200 tenting sites and 5 Adirondack shelters. Wheeler Lodge accommodates up to 120 youth and leaders. We offer a swimming pool, sports equipment and more. Just 1½ hours' drive from Toronto area tourist attractions. Contact the Administrative Centre for bookings.

Goodyear Memorial Scout Camp (60 km north of Mississauga). This year-round 260 acre camp, located on the rim of the scenic Hockley Valley near Orangeville, contains many campsites and some year-round buildings and shelters in a mixture of wooded and open areas. The Bruce Trail passes within one kilometre of the camp. Goodyear provides an excellent location for groups visiting Toronto (1½ hrs from downtown). Contact the Administrative Centre for bookings.

Haliburton Scout Reserve (3 hours from downtown Toronto). Consisting of 5,000 acres, this is the largest Scout camp in Canada, located in the popular vacation area of Central Ontario. Contains a large lake with the typical rocky shores of the Cambrian Shield along with heavy forest and abundant wildlife. Numerous campsites accessible by water are available as well as many program support facilities and resources for visiting groups. Contact the Administrative Centre for bookings.

Camp Manitou - (15 km north of Burlington - 45 minutes from downtown Toronto). This year round 100-acre camp is located just off the Bruce Trail near Campbellville and contains many campsites, some year-round buildings and shelters in a mixture of wooded and open areas. The camp has easy access to many conservation areas offering skiing, mountain biking, swimming and miles of trail. This is an excellent location for groups visiting Toronto. Contact the Administrative Centre for bookings.

Camp Wildman located on the south side of 8th Concession Road of Tiny Township. The camp has three lodges capable of accommodating 42, 24 and 9 people respectively. All lodges have electricity and the largest has hot and cold running water year round. The 24-bunk lodge has hot and cold running water during the summer months only. All lodges are equipped with electric stoves and refrigerators. In addition, the two large lodges offer clothes dryers and electric heating. Other accommodation facilities include four 3-sided shelters with 12 bunks each. Outside camping areas accommodate more than three hundred in groomed and wilderness areas. Camp Attawandaron is located 10 minutes south of Grand Bend bordering on the Pinery Provincial Park on Highway 21. The camp is set on 190 acres of Oak Savannah forest bordering the Ausable River. The land is hilly with both easy and difficult hiking trails. There are patrol sites throughout as well as fields for larger events. There are two winterized lodges with full kitchen, dining and washroom facilities. The Beaver Lodge area has an accommodation room that will sleep 24 and the Burr Lodge will sleep 19. The area has six summer Adirondacks and four sleep cabins. The camp has a climbing/rappelling tower as well as a zip line.

The Bryson Centre is located in the north end of London. This 12-acre site is located along the side of the Thames River. There are numerous tenting sites, eight Adirondacks and a fully serviced lodge with kitchen/dining area as well as accommodation for 24 youth and five adults. The lodge is also equipped with showers and washrooms. This is an ideal spot to explore the outdoors and the city.

Camp Catarqui is located 30 minutes east of Chatham on the bluffs of Lake Erie and is set amongst the Clearville Nature Forest. It has a mix of forested areas, patrol sites, trails (for hiking or biking). McGeachy Lodge has a kitchen and dining area with washrooms and showers. There are two small sleep cabins accommodating eight people each as well as the lodge which sleeps 30 on the floor. Another small lodge sleeps 15 and has propane lighting and a woodstove for heating.

Camp Cedarwin (Approximately 40 km from Windsor near Kingsville). This 74-acre camp is situated in one of a few remaining Carolinian forests in Canada by Lake Erie. The propeller site offers three self-contained year-round cabin wings each for 24 youth and six leaders. Each cabin is equipped with kitchen, washrooms and dining area. Tenting sites are available throughout the property. A large picnic shelter is on site as well as a couple of smaller buildings which can accommodate 10-12 people. Canoes are available.

Camp Impeesa is located 20 minutes west of Brantford. The camp is a mix of forested area with patrol sites and sports fields, picnic shelter and a large field for larger events. There are two cabins with dining, kitchen and washroom areas. One cabin accommodates 20 and the other sleeps 40.

Mount Nemo Camp is located 10 minutes north of Burlington. This 165-acre camp is on the Bronte Creek and one half kilometre from the Bruce Trail. The camp has nine cabins accommodating 10-30 campers, 8 Adirondacks (in three groupings), tenting sites and fields for larger events. There is access to rock climbing on the Niagara Escarpment at Mount Nemo and Rattlesnake Point Conservation Area.

Ragged Falls is located on the Oxtongue River, off Highway 60 near Dwight, Ontario and only five minutes from the Western Gate of Algonquin Park. It is an ideal spot to learn basic canoeing or to launch for canoe tripping. The one building on site sleeps eight on the floor and is equipped with a kerosene heater. You need to bring your own kerosene and water.

Camp Shegardaynou is located 20 minutes east of Woodstock. The camp has 53 acres of wooded land with Horner Creek running through it. There are patrol sites throughout and a larger field for camporees. The camp is equipped with several smaller indoor heated buildings with a sleeping capacity of 30, kitchen and dining areas. Washrooms and showers are in a separate heated building.

Camp Sylvan is located 45 minutes northwest of London. This 270-acre camp has a number of theme sites – Frontierland, The Caboozes, The Pines camping area and Hidden Springs. The site has numerous patrol and troop camp sites. Frontierland has a full kitchen/dining hall, a bunkhouse accommodating 32 with washrooms and showers and wagons that will sleep 44 (May through September). Hidden Springs sleeps 36 and the three cabooses will sleep 34 with a kitchen/dining hall. Camping areas provide patrol sites as well as large fields for camporees.

Camp Timkin is located 20 minutes west of St. Thomas. The camp is a forested area with the Talbot Creek running through it. There are several patrol tent sites, a picnic shelter and large fields for larger camporees. The main lodge has meeting facilities, washrooms, kitchen and dining area. Two small sleep cabins provide indoor accommodation for a total of 24.

Camp Wadiscoca is located near Wallaceburg. It is situated on a small river. Wadiscoca has forested patrol sites as well as cleared areas for large camporees. There is a dining hall and kitchen with washrooms and showers. Several smaller buildings can accommodate up to 46 campers. The camp also has a climbing/rapelling tower as well as a zip line and rope bridge.

Camp Wetaskiwin is located at the edge of St. Catharines. This campsite has easy access to Niagara Falls (20 minutes). Accommodations range from lodges (sleeping 12-60 people) to

11 campsites nestled amongst three converging hills. There is access to hiking trails and wilderness as well as the neighbouring Short Hills Provincial Park. This camp has a swimming pool on site.

Camp Buchan is located 48 km east of Charlottetown just 4 km off the Trans Canada Highway on Point Prim Highway 209. The camp is situated on acres of prime camping area with modern services and an excellent swimming area on high tides. The central lodge and cabins are winterized.

Camp Kildare – located 1 km east of Alberton on Highway 12, the site offers a large lodge (with kitchen and dining areas) that will sleep 30. The camp is located on 5 acres next to shoreline. No swimming. A beach is accessible approximately 3 km from the campsite.

Camp Riverdale is 20 km west of Charlottetown just 4 km off the Trans Canada Highway on Highway 245. Two lodges and a main dining hall are available. Each winterized lodge will sleep 30 and each has a kitchen and dining area. This is a wooded site with no swimming.

Tamaracouta Scout Reserve – The oldest continuously operated Scout camp in the world, with the longest covered picnic table in Canada, is open year round. Located 60 km from Montreal in the Lower Laurentian Mountains, this 1000-acre site encompasses Lake Tamaracouta. Many campsites are available and over 30 buildings that include a winterized "Longhouse," 8 cabins, 6 cabooses and a lodge. Facilities can accom-

modate over 170. Rentals are available for canoes, snowshoes and cross-country skis. Full staff-supported summer program includes sailing, canoeing, kayaking, ecology, and archery. Composite camp program available for Scout/Venturer age youth.

Anglin Lake Semi-Wilderness Camp – Located 40 minutes north of Prince Albert on Highway 2. The camp features a variety of tent campsites, boats, archery and rifle ranges and an obstacle course. There is a service corps to run program on site (weekends from May 20 to June 26 and full time June 27 to September 5). Drinking water, flush toilets (May 20 to September 5), firewood and garbage collection are provided.

Camp Gilwell – Located north of Regina on the shore of Mission Lake on Highway 56, the 40-acre camp offers opportunities for all camping and outdoor activities. The north section of the camp is mostly undeveloped and a good area for practicing no-trace camping. The camp offers year-round fresh water pressure system, lighted parking, program area, toilets and a wheelchair accessible lodge that has 1000 square feet of activity/sleeping/training area with fireplace. The bunkhouse has 500 square feet of space and privacy area for a leader. Equipped with natural gas heating and electricity.

Camp Seonee – This rustic campsite is located at the north end of Pike Lake Provincial Camp about 30 km south of Saskatoon. There are three villages, two with dining hall/kitchen buildings and electricity as well as heated cabins sleeping 24 on bunk beds. The third is an all-purpose heated building with 18 bunks and an outdoor kitchen. There are several tent sites with fire rings available for group use. Pit toilets are located throughout the camp and treated water is available at the on-site pump house. Wildlife is abundant. Water channels are suitable for boating – swimming is not advised. There is a service corps to run program on site weekends from May 20 to June 26 and full time from June 27 to September 5.
