Sample Outline for a Scouts Own

A very brief outline is such:

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- The Relate the content to the age level of the youth.
- Involve the youth in preparing for Scouts Own. Supply resources and help them select the readings or verses. During the ceremony, ask different youth to read them out loud.
- Provide opportunities to move, by sitting, standing, clapping, or doing actions to a song.
- If you have a theme to your camp, involve the theme in the Scouts Own too.
- Try to hold it outdoors.
- If there are different faiths present, focus on common threads such as love, friendship, helping others, etc.
- ^{There} Mix it up. Start with a reading or short fable, sing a song, another verse, two songs and finish with a prayer or repeat the section Promise.

Holding a Scouts Own is one way we can work on achieving this principle. Scouts Own can be at any time, any place and acceptable to all faiths. It is not a religious ceremony; it is a spiritual celebration.

The following Scouts Owns were submitted to the *Leader Magazine*. Perhaps you'll find one "ready-made" for your next camp. Of course, you can add and subtract songs, readings, or stories to make them special to your group. Provide the words to the songs if they are not known to the youth.

THEME: FRIENDSHIP

OPENING:

God our Father, bless us as we gather here today Help us all to understand our Promise better Teach us to love you more To love all your people And to serve our country faithfully.

PRAYER:

A Beaver (Cub, Scout, etc.) Thank You

Thank you for Beavers (Cubs, Scouts, etc.) We learn how to share Thank you for leaders who show us how to care; Help us to learn to have fun at our play, And how to work hard for our family each day; The world would be much better, we know, For the love and the friendship we learn how to show.

SONG:

Love is Something

Love is something if you give it away, Give it away, give it away Love is something if you give it away, It will come right back to you.

A smile is something if you give it away...

Friendship is something if you give it away...

STORY:

The Friendship Stick

When God created this wonderful earth, he made it a place filled with brilliant colours, the flowers, the trees, the birds, and animals. "But," said God, "my world is not complete. I need to create a higher being, one who can think and who will take care of the earth. I will call him man. He will have a wife and children and I will call this a family."

God thought, "I have many colours in my world. I must have colour in my people as well. I will create people who are yellow — the colour of the glowing sun which gives warmth and light. I will make people who are black — the colour of the deep starry night which gives quiet and peace. Some of my people will be brown — the colour of the warm earth where seeds grow to feed my people. Lastly, I will make some of my people white like the cool, crisp snow of winter."

"All of my people must have eyes to see the beauty around them." God thought. "Some eyes will be brown like the many small birds that sing in the trees, and some eyes I will make blue, the colour of the beautiful sky."

On each Friendship Stick there are six circles. The two

at the top represent eyes — one brown and one blue. Below are four circles. The top is yellow, which represents the yellow-skinned people. There are more yellow skins in the world than any other. The next circle is black. The second greatest number of people in the world have black skin. The third circle is brown for the brown skins of the world. The last circle is white. This is the colour of the fewest people in the world.

When your stick is complete, you must not keep it. But instead, give it to someone else as a sign of friendship.

CLOSING SONG:

THEME: CHILDREN

OPENING:

If a child lives with criticism, he learns to condemn; If a child lives with hostility, he learns to fight; If a child lives with ridicule, he learns to be shy; If a child lives with shame, he learns to feel guilty.

If a child lives with tolerance, he learns to be patient; If a child lives with praise; he learns to appreciate; If a child lives with fairness, he learns justice; If a child lives with security, he learns to have faith; If a child lives with approval, he learns to like himself; If a child lives with acceptance and friendship, he learns to find love in the world.

SONG:

The More We Get Together (Scouts Canada's Song Book)

READING: (Give each line to different children in your group to read aloud.)

The United Nations Declaration of the Rights of the Child

- The right to a name and nationality.
- The right to affection, love and understanding and to material security.
- The right to adequate nutrition, housing and medical services.

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- The right to special care if handicapped, be it physically, mentally or socially.
- The right to be among the first to receive protection and relief in all circumstances.
- The right to be protected against all forms of neglect, cruelty and exploitation.
- The right to full opportunity for play and recreation and equal opportunity to free and compulsory education, to enable the child to develop his individual abilities and to become a useful member of society.
- The right to develop his full potential in conditions of freedom and dignity.
- The right to be brought up in a spirit of understanding, tolerance, friendship among peoples, peace and universal brotherhood.
- The right to enjoy these rights regardless of race, colour, sex, religion, political or other opinion, national or social origin, and property, birth, or other status.

SONG:

Magic Penny (Singing Fun and Games, by Jack Pearse)

CLOSING: (Give each line to different children to read aloud.)

- From the very beginning of his education, the child should experience the joy of discovery.
- There is only one beautiful child in the world, and every mother has it.
- Our greatest natural resource is the minds of our children.
- Children are like sponges, they absorb all your strength and leave you limp. But give them a squeeze and you get it all back.
- Children don't care how much we know until they know how much we care.

OPENING:

Come what may,

STORY: Everybody's Canoe
