The last day was spent travelling down Barron Canyon. As we got closer to the end, reality started to set in. Our adventure was almost over; school would start the day after we returned.



As each participant recorded their thoughts and experiences in their summaries, the same theme wove itself through their words. The trip was harder than expected, but together with the support of their fellow adventurers, they pulled together and accomplished their Mission.
