

CASH WITH ORDER ALWAYS.

The Stores Department has no facilities for maintaining credit accounts. DO NOT SEND CURRENCY, unless in a registered envelope. Postage Stampe MUST NOT BE USED in payment as it is against Postal Regulations. Express Money Orders, Post Office Money Orders or Postal Notes are recommended for use; they cost little and are absolutely safe. When remitting by cheque cost of exchange must be added.

ALL TRANSPORTATION CHARGES PAID.



An article that will "Put you right."

This is the correct manner in which to carry a colour "At the Slope," and is the method which should always be observed when marching. The usual flags for a Troop should be the Union Jack and a Scout Troop Flag bearing the name of the Troop, while for a Pack it should be the Union Jack and the Pack flag, bearing the name of the Pack. The size of the Union Jack when used as a "colour" should be 3 ft. 9 ins. by 3 ft., and when used for a flag staff the length should be double the width. Both these sizes are listed in this Catalogue (see page 34). There are only two correct ways of carrying a Colour. Either:

- A. At the "Slope."
- B. At the "Carry."

When marching, the proper method is at "the Slope" which means the pole being rested on the shoulder, as in Figure 1, and the flag held against the pole between the finger and thumb so that it hangs in graceful folds.

There is a very common practice amongst Troops and Packs to carry a flag sticking out like a Friendly Society's Banner (Figure 2). This is absolutely wrong and looks very bad. The other way to carry a Colour is, as stated above, "at the Carry," when the flag carrier should be used, see Figure 3, but it is only done on certain ceremonial occasions, such as:

A. Marching past the Saluting Base at a Rally.

B. Carrying the Colour in a Church.C. Passing sentries who salute.

When holding the flag "at the Carry" great care must be taken that the knuckles of the hand holding the flag should be at the front, Figure 3. Colours should be allowed to fly out and lowered only for a Royal Salute to His Majesty the King, members of the Royal Family, and to His Excellency the Governor General as the representative of the King. (See Figure 4.) The Union Jack is always the King's Colour, except in the

Brigade of Guards where it is the Regimental Colour, and the King's Colour is a deep red flag with the King's cipher and other emblems on it. The King's Colour (Union Jack) is always carried on the right.

NOTE:—Leaders of Troops and Packs are requested to take careful note of the above regulations.

On page 34 of this Catalogue will be found listed the "Official" Flags and Equipment necessary for Troops and Packs.





IMPORTANT:—Desired Uniformity in Scout Dress:—It is highly important to the regard in which Scouts shall be held by the general public that their dress, like their conduct, should be orderly. Appearance in varied nondescript outfits creates an unfavorable impression which does not encourage other boys to desire to become Scouts. Every effort should be made, therefore, in each community and for each troop therein, to adopt a STANDARD UNIFORM from the OFFICIAL EQUIPMENT listed in this catalogue.

If there is a local Association they should determine what the standard uniform in their community is to be, and all troops under their control when appearing upon official occasions should adhere to the form of dress adopted. Troops not under a local Association should likewise adopt for themselves a common standard outfit for official use. No option should be permitted in major essentials. These essentials are few. It should be decided whether the shirt is to be khaki, blue, green or grey, or whether shorts or breeches shall be worn in blue or khaki. Shorts are strongly recommended (winter excepted) but if special local conditions advise breeches, all should wear them, not some breeches and others shorts. The different Standard Scout Outfits listed in this catalogue will be of help in deciding which uniform to adopt.





A Scout! He enjoys a trek through the woods more than he does a walk over the city's streets. He can tell directions by the stars, or with his watch. When matches are forgotten he laughs and proceeds to make a fire bow. The fire once started, what a breakfast, dinner, or supper he can prepare out there in the open! Does he enjoy the meal? Just watch him!

A Scout does not run away or call for help when an accident occurs. If a person has been cut he uses his first-aid knowledge in stopping the flow of blood. If a person has been burned his knowledge tells him how to alleviate the suffering. If any one should be dragged from the water unconscious a Scout at once sets to work to restore respiration and circulation.

A Scout can talk to a brother Scout with signalling flags and in other secret ways.

A Scout can tie a knot that will hold, he can climb a tree the ascent of which seems impossible to others, he can swim a river, he can patch a tent, he can mend a tear in his trousers, he can tell you what weeds are poisonous and what are not; he knows the names of birds and animals.

A Scout is kind to everything that lives. He knows that horses, dogs, and cats have their rights, and he respects them. A Scout prides himself upon doing kind deeds and no day in his life is complete unless he has been of aid to some person.

A Scout never uses alcoholic liquors, because he does not wish to poison his body; he desires a clear, active brain and so he avoids tobacco. He never swears, because swearing is a sign of weakness as well as being sacrilegious.

In fact a Scout aims to be, in this, the twentieth century, as near as possible like those men, who, two and three hundred years ago, laid the foundation for what has become the British Empire. In those days our forefathers had to be ready for any emergency, and as a Scout of the present emulates the Scout of the past, he has chosen as his motto, "Be Prepared," and a better phrase could

not have been selected, for it is both a motto and a slogan all in one. Be Prepared for anything—to do a kind act, to rescue a companion, to ford a stream, to gather kindling, to salute the fiag, to build a fire—always be prepared.

A SLEEPING SACK FOR SCOUTS.

How to keep warm at night is information that every Scout can use to good advantage. There is no warmth in blankets, a statement which will no doubt surprise you. All the heat used in keeping you warm at night-unless. of course, you have a fire-must come from your own body. The blanket merely serves the purpose of keeping the heat from getting away. So the best material for making blankets is that which is the poorest conductor of heat. Wool is a poor conductor of heat. That's why woollen blankets are "warmer" than cotton ones. One thing that will make you cold quicker than anything else is draughts. If there is a tiny opening where the wind can get in, out of the blankets goes the warm air and in comes the cold: and if the night is at all chilly, you soon begin to shiver and shake.

The problem you have got to solve then, is to arrange your blankets so that they will be draught-proof. Most sleeping sacks are too expensive for Scouts, so we'll have to use our wits and think of a good substitute. On page 23 of this Catalogue you will find Blanket Pins listed, six for 25 cents, these are what you require. When you are ready for bed, fold one side of your blanket lengthwise to the middle. Then fold the other side clear across. You now have three layers of blanket. Fold the blanket up about 6 or 8 inches at foot and fasten down with the pins.

Sleep with the double ply at your back. To do so place your hands on the two bottom plies and slip carefully into your sack. Lie still for a few minutes and you will be quite snug and warm. If your blanket is very thin use two, in fact, you will find it makes a better sack to use two as the extra layers of air between the blankets will keep you warmer, as air is a very good non-conductor of heat.



HOW TO WASH UNIFORMS.

- 1. MATERIAL.—The different materials used in the OFFICIAL Boy Scout and Wolf Cub Uniforms have been selected after most careful investigation, and have been standardized by Headquarters for use in the Movement.
- 2. GUARANTEE.—The materials are guaranteed by the Manufacturers as well as by Dominion Head-quarters. All garments have the OFFICIAL label of the Association, and cases of unsatisfactory service should be reported.
- 3. WASHING .- The cloth should be washed in luke warm water with a soap similar to Ivory or any other which does not contain much alkaline matter. Lay the garment on a board; scrub thoroughly with a coarse brush. Do not under any circumstances rub the soap directly on the cloth as this is injurious. Rinse, first in warm water, and then in cold water to which at least two cups of coffee grounds have been added. This will help to maintain the original appearance of the garment. When rinsing it is not advisable to leave the garment an excessive time in water.

Garments should be wrung out with the hand and rough dried.

Iron by using a piece of ordinary white drill as an ironing cloth to cover the garment.

TAKE CARE OF YOUR SCOUT HAT.

It pays to take care of one's hat. When not on the head it should be placed on a flat surface. If hung up or stood on edge the brim may assume a permanent curve neither comfortable in wear nor attractive in appearance.

A soft and floppy brim can be temporarily improved by ironing. The iron should not be applied direct, but a thin cloth, which should be slightly damp, should first be placed over the brim. Care must be taken to see that the strap or lace is not under the brim whilst this operation is being carried out.

WHAT IS A ROVER SCOUT? THE REASON WHY.

What is a Rover, and why is it necessary to have such a branch of the Boy Scout Movement? The answer is very simple if one gives the matter a minute's thought. Scouting began as a Boys' Movement; it was an experiment, and an experiment that worked. It was not long before it was found that it attracted boys of all ages, and to provide for the younger ones from 8-12 years of age the Wolf Cub Branch was started. This emphasis on the younger boys, perhaps, together with the name of the Movement "The Boy Scouts Association," made the senior fellows, in many cases, feel it was a kids' show"; in spite of the fact that the Rules have always provided for boys staying on in the Movement to any age, although not supposed to join after 18; and so a large number left their Troops at the age of 14-16, when they felt it was no longer a game for them.

There were, however, many splendid exceptions to this rule—and the work of those Scoutmasters who overcame these difficulties in the early days of the Movement cannot be too highly praised, as they showed that the Spirit of Scouting implanted in a boy can be developed into a real asset not only to the young man himself, but to the Nation of which he is a member, and so to the World at large.

In order to extend this senior side of our work a separate branch was formed, after much careful thought and experiment, with the object of retaining the young men and emphasising the fact that it was always intended that they should stay. Incidentally, too, it provides for the large number of young men who have had the advantage of being Scouts when boys and who can thus link up with the Movement.



Rovering has made us think in terms of "Young Men" as opposed to "Boys," and it is here where the real secret of success of the Rover Branch is to be found. The work must be harder, the play more strenuous, and the outlook broader than that of the boy, and this can only be done successfully where the young men are banded together in such a way as to allow of it.

Therefore the Rover Branch of the Movement is a natural growth, and it demands the attention and study of all Commissioners and Scouters, for does not the future of the whole Brotherhood largely depend on the development of this, our Senior Section, upon the right

Not only will the Movement be judged by the men it produces, but the Rovers of to-day will produce the men to carry

on our Brotherhood in the future.

As the Chief Scout says in "Rovering to Success"; "The object of the Rover Section of the Movement is to enable young men to develop themselves as happy, healthy and useful citizens, and to give each his chance of making a successful career for himself."

Never was the world so much in need of good citizens as it is to-day, and so in Rovering, through its Brotherhood and Service for Others, the Chief has outlined a practical way of developing the Scout training to fit the requirements of young men of to-day, and to help them to combat those tendencies which are threatening to undermine the character of the Nation.

BOOKS FOR ROVERS AND YOUNG MEN.


ROVERING TO SUCCESS, by Sir Robert Baden-Powell.

A Sea Scout is first and foremost a Boy Scout. This must never be forgotten.

Well-to-do boys have opportunities for yachting and boating, and our object is to give the poorer boy his chance also of becoming an amateur sailor, with all its joys and all its benefits.

The Sea Scout should have all the attributes of a Scout combined with those of a sailor or waterman, according to locality. The combination should make the ideal citizen.

The Sea Scout training, moulded as it is for the development of true citizenship, is applicable to all lads, whether destined for a land or sea life.

The average education runs necessarily very much in a groove, whereas a boy wants variety. The seaman's training is generally considered to be practically equal to that of a backwoodsman in producing manliness and character. In Scouting and Sea Scouting the endeavour is made to tack a combination of these two forms of training on to the ordinary education of the boy, with a view to completeness in his equipment as a citizen.

The first thing to grasp in Sea Scout training is that Sea Scouting is not Training Ship work. We only have the boys with us for a few hours in the week instead of every day and all day, and we Sea Scoutmasters are not trained instructors. If we try to drill our boys into smartness, or to instruct them in the details of navigation at first starting off, we are going to make a very second-rate job of it, if not a total failure.

Scoutmasters are not trained instructors. It we try to drill our boys into Smarlness, or to instruct them in the details of navigation at first starting off, we are going to make a very second-rate job of it, if not a total failure.

Fortunately we have in our hands a powerful lever which counterbalances our handicap of being untrained instructors, and one which the ordinary schools appear to be unable to use—we have the desire and enthusiasm of the boy himself to help us. We need only play up to that to get the best results. Schools have to direct their teaching so that they shall produce efficiency; we do not—at least, not in the first instance—for the above reasons. We cannot hope for success if we do. Our first step is to develop the right Spirit, and once you have got that, efficiency will follow all the more effectively, because it is worked up by the boy himself.

Sea Scouting does not necessarily involve a troop being at the seaside. Inland cities can raise and train quite efficient troops as has been proved many times over in practice. The ideal Headquarters is a barge, or houseboat, moored in a river, canal, or creek. This, with its fleet gradually built up of salling or rowing-boats, canoes, rafts, etc., forms the centre for aquatic activities. In any case, whether the Headquarters are on land or water, the troop should possess a rigged mast for developing physical strength, activity, and self-confidence, such as are gained by continually going aloft.

The Sea Scout method is on the same principle as that for other scouts, namely, through activities and games that really appeal to the boy, and not through drill and formal instruction. The principal aim, as in the case of all Scouting, is always Good Citizenship on a really up-to-date line of training, through the development of (1) Character; (2) Health.

Under character we include individual manliness, self-discipline, energy, reliability, happlness, and "handimanness."



By swinging the staff out over the water, beyond the floating article, you will be able to draw the latter in close to shore.

URING 1927 The Boy Scouts Association of Canada will play its part in celebrating the Diamond Jubilee of Canadian Confederation.

This will mean participation in local celebrations by Scout Troops and Cub Packs in every part of the Dominion.

The extent to which Scouts and Cubs can participate effectively will depend, in the first place, upon their being **neatly and properly uniformed.**

Incidentally these special occasions will provide opportunities for demonstrating some of the important results of the Scout training—alertness, neatness, smartness; the team work suggested by a standard type of uniform for each Troop or Pack. Unfortunately, false ideas as to the general standards of Scout training have been given the public by Scouts, Cubs and leaders who have not given due thought to the kind of uniform they wore.

Let us whenever appearing in public this year show what real Scouts and Cubs look like--wearing only a uniform which is neat and correct, and "Official for Canada."

Scouts and Cubs--if the matter has not yet been decided, ask your Patrol Leader or Sixer, or Scoutmaster or Cubmaster, what the standard uniform for your Troop or Pack is to be. Leaders--if you have not already done so, discuss this most important point with your Court of Honour or Pack Council.
