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





O WHAT A TANGLED WEB WE WEAVE

SONGS OF A ROVER CAMPFIRE



QUESTING

I've left this subject to the last not because I don't think it's as important as the others — on the contrary, in my humble opinion, it's the most important training — but because I'm not sure I can properly get my point across. I mean, when all Rovers are involved with quests in one form or another yet very few, if any, actual call them that, organize and present them as quests or recognize their achievement as questors. Confused? I certainly hope so!

Not so many years ago (late 60's) there was a popular record out called "The Impossible Dream" and if you followed the lyrics, they made reference to "following the quest" or "impossible dream". Does that mean that a quest is an "impossible dream"? Interesting theory!

I guess I'm sometimes a dreamer. Did you ever lie back and imagine what it would be like to . . . drive the fastest dragster on the strip . . . own a harem . . . sky-dive from a plane . . . build your own house . . . run your own business . . . be an astronaut on the first trip to Mars. Or, perhaps, you've occasionally thought about . . . extra terrestial beings studying us under a microscope . . . just how much of the Bible is fact and how much is fiction . . . becoming a parent . . . what it was like living in the old west! But then, surely, I'm not the only one who's thought these thoughts.

Now, what's all this nonsense got to do with questing? Surprisingly, quite a bit! Life would be awfully dull, unimaginative and non-progressive if we didn't dream dreams, think thoughts and, going one step further, try things out, experiment, practice. Aha! So is this what questing is all about? Trying out our ideas?

Well—a quest could be. Take for example Columbus . . . It took a lot of guts to prove to the skeptics that you would not fall off the edge of the earth by sailing into the sunset. And, to his surprise along the way, he just happened to bump into North America, for which I belatedly thank him. Now it's unlikely that our quests would be quite so startling—but you never know until you try.

I'm sorry I haven't been very specific about what a quest is. Maybe I can make things easier by saying what it isn't. It isn't an assignment forced upon you whether you like it or not; it's not a penalty for not doing something; it shouldn't be impossible, unbearable, unenjoyable or unbeneficial. It should be definitive, enjoyable, interesting and beneficial. Ideally, it is a project voluntarily undertaken by a Rover who is seeking to further develop himself. Its scope is unlimited but should be challenging and important. There should be a time limit and objectives set, the process of learning should be recorded for both the Rover and the Crew and most importantly, the quest should be evaluated, once completed.

QUESTING (cont'd.)


Now that might seem quite involved, but let's look at a couple of examples and see where they lead us. Some of you may personally think that your musical ability is second to none and you'd really like to know whether you should pursue the hobby as a career. Without going into great detail, if I was faced with this situation, I'd decide to do a quest on either the music industry (the one that you fit into) or musicians. What's the life really like, the hours, living conditions, stability, salary, ego—successes, travel, side effects. Chances are, it would be a big quest, but with some planning ahead of time, organizing priorities, establishing objectives and a time frame to work within, you'd amaze yourself at just how much you could learn and accomplish. With even more planning you could also involve other members or even the whole Crew in parts of your quest.

But it needn't be limited to careers. Hobbies, experiments and general interest items are important too. If you thought it'd be nice to grow a garden or build a cottage, it's absolutely incredible the vast amount of information you'll uncover if you'll follow your quest. Recearch and discovery are forms of quests. Here's a small list of topics that could generate ideas for quests.

- 1. The Quest of Vocations and Careers;
- The Quest of Governments and Politics;
- The Quest of Religions and Spiritual Awareness;
- 4. The Quest of Arts (Art, Music, Theatrics);
- 5. The Quest of Sciences (Mathematics, Biology);
- 6. The Quest of the Younger Brother (Voluntary Leadership):
- 7. The Quest of Geography and History (Trade);
- 8. The Quest of Trades and Hobbies (Auto Mechanics, Carpentry, Lapidary);
- .9. The Quest of Ecology (Conservation, Service);
- 10. The Quest of Personal Fitness (Health, Hygiene, Exercise).

There is no more convincing way to show a quest in practice, than B.-P.'s dream that became Scouting. Now let's see what you can do!

SAFE OFFROADING

Okay, so you've finally got it; a bright, shiny, new or secondhand four wheel drive, now what? Well, you can go charging off into the scrub and most likely return in one piece with minimal damage but what if you have a flat tyre, get bogged, run out of petrol, blow a welsh plug or break an axle. Unfortunately these things do happen and even more unfortunately, the N.R.M.A. aren't around or equipped to help you when you're six miles this side of the black stump.

Not a very rosy picture for the new offroader but nonetheless true. However if you go prepared, most problems can be overcome, with varying

degrees of ease.

The following checklist may help you to get prepared, but remember

it isn't perfect.

Basic tools such as a jack, jack handle, wheel brace and maybe a crank should be carried and you should know how to use them. If you're going into rough country, take a reasonable tool kit including spanners or a socket set (make sure they fit the type of nuts and bolts or whitworth that are used on your vehicle- AF will not fit metric fasteners), hammer, pliers, couple of screwdrivers (normal and Phillips Head), a collection of nuts and bolts, some electrical tape and a few pieces of wire.

If you are going off the beaten track, carry some spare parts such as radiator hoses (get the universal type), fan belt, welsh plugs, spark plug, fuses, light bulbs and tyre patches. Also certain vehicles tend to break certain parts more often than others. For instance, if you own a six cylinder Landrover with Rover differentials, take a spare long rear axle. Remember, know how to fit all these kits or pieces, otherwise they're no good to you.

Take a tyre pump, this will allow you to pump up your typres after negotiating sandy conditions and top up your spare after putting it on. Get a good pump that will do the job you want. Also, take a shovel, preferably one with a reasonable handle. The cheap folding army surplus ones aren't much good for digging out a bogged vehicle.

Include a water repellent such as RP7 or WD40 in your tool kit. Before crossing a creek or any deep water, spray the distributor coil, spark plugs and ignition and you may make it across on the first attempt. Take jumper leads and a 12 volt lead light- you never know when you might need them.

The most obvious thing to take is enough fuel, but so often beginners tend to think that a Land Cruiser is as thrifty as a Mini. If you're travelling in the outback take spare oil and brake fluid. Also carry water-you can't rely on air to cool the engine.

Know your vehicle, get to understand your four wheel drive's engine and gear box' find out how your fuel, water, electrical and ignition system work. You've got a fighting chance to fix it if you know how it works.


Carry a first aid kit, nothing fancy: a couple of triangular bandages, 'z", 1" and 2" crepe bandages, some antiseptic and maybe some aspirins and sunburn creams will suffice. The most important item in first aid is knowledge. If you're going to be in the bush on a long trip do the St. John's Ambulance Course before you go. You may save someone's life. Perhaps even your own.


OFFROADING CONTINUED

Remember, use your common sense, don't try anything that so overly dangerous. If you do get into problems, don't panic, think carefully and rationally and more than likely your preparation will offer a solution.


THE WATER DEBATE


sea, affecting its delicate salt concentrations and so threatening fish life.
