


Rovering is the key to the whole Scouting movement:





### THE CANADIAN ROVER MOOT


Sitting half slouched against the rotted and weathered remains of an old tree stump, I gazed around the ever-shrinking circle of Rovers huddled about the now dying fire. It was well after midnight and most had already given in and retired to their tents. One of the Rover Skippers strummed lightly on his guitar, which earlier had provided the background for a long list of "old favourite" folk songs. Standing back of me, and slightly to my right, were two Rovers (possibly a squire and his sponsor) whom had been there for some time. Earlier they'd joined in the sing-song but now they were discussing Rovering ---- I couldn't help but eavesdrop a little, because the topic of conversation was "Rover Moots - Why Are We Here?" They raised some good, interesting points, and here is what I heard.

"In the dictionary, the word Moot, as seen by Webster and others, has be laid to print as: an Eskimo word meaning gathering of the clans, or from England, meaning an assembly, meeting place, freedom meeting".

"Rovers have gathered together from time to time since their inception in 1917. Whether these first assemblies were indeed called Moots is uncertain, but here in 1980, the Moot is an entrenched tradition, with deep roots for some. Reasons for holding such events haven't changed a great deal, even as related to the original conception of Moots. The Rover Rambler (no longer with us) of 1951 outlined these reasons from a poll, a the 1st Canadian National Rover Moot. Hence:

- 1. Food, Fun, Fellowship
- 2. Contact with other Rovers & Crews
- 3. Exchange of Ideas
- 4. Secure a "Canadian" viewpoint on Rovering
- 5. Inspiration of living together in common Brotherhood
- 6. Activities (Rover)
- 7. Sleep The Staff

If each of us stops to consider these six (seventh doesn't count) reasons, I'm sure a hundred others would come to mind. We all have our own ideas to add to the question, "Why Moots?"

# PROFILE



# Orv O'Brien

There is one person in Eastern Ontario who has kept the Rover flame burning over the years and that is Orv O'Brien. He joined the 2nd Ottawa Scout Troop (Ottawa's oldest Scout Troop founded in 1909) as a recruit in 1941 and worked his way through the Troop as Assistant Patrol, Patrol and Troop Leader. In 1948 he became Assistant Scoutmaster and attended CJ '49 working with the Health Unit.

It was during 1950 that he became involved in Rovering. The "Central" Rover Crew which met at the Ottawa District Office were informed the room used as their Den was required because of the growth in the District. Groups of Rovers went out about the District meeting with various Group Committees to see if they would accept the Crew into their group and hopefully allow them a room for a Den. Orv was present the night the Rovers came to the 2nd Group — it was part of the Group Committees plans to start a Rover Crew and here was a group already set up and raring to go. The only stipulation presented by the committee was the Group number and neckerchief be worn by the Crew. This was agreed to and the old coal bin in the basement was turned over to the crew to become their den as they saw fit. Many nights and weekends went into converting the bin into a room fit for human habitation and a close comradeship developed. Application for Squireship was made by four of the Assistant Leaders of which Orv was one of them. Plans were now in the works for the Crew to attend the 1st National Rover Moot at Blue Springs and this was carried out with everyone (15) attending, it was at this Moot he met a fellow by the name of Bodahn Mykelyn and this friendship is still strong. It was in 1953 that Orv took over the Scout Troop as Scoutmaster but still had time to assist the Crew at CJ '53 where they worked on baggage, it was there the Crew first wore a beret instead of the stetson as they were much more practical when climbing in and out of baggage cars. Major-General Dan Spry (then Chief Scout Executive) did not agree with the use of berets and if the Crew did not get into proper uniform it would be sent home. How things have changed.

An invitation was extended to him to attend the 2nd National Moot in Sussex, N.B. and again to help the Crew with the task of assisting the Transportation Committee for the 8th World Jamboree in 1955 at Niagara-on-the-Lake move 13 000 Scouts from the site to Toronto and back for the opening of the Ex. it was during this time he watched his Scout Troop rise to sixty boys with one Assistant but a darn good Patrol System. In one year fourteen Scouts went up to the Rover Crew and again invitations were extended to join them at the 3rd National Moot in Banff, Alberta and the 4th in Quebec.

A change in Rover Leaders came about in 1960 and some of the new recruits from the Troop were not acceptable to the Crew and came back with tales of woe. Meetings were held with the Crew and Group Committee but they could not be resolved with the result that rather than send Scouts up to the Crew, a Mini-Crew came into being and existed until 1963. This was World Jamboree year and Orv volunteered to work in Sub-Camp Aenthis at Marathon, Greece with Quartermaster Stores. When the old Crew did not register, the mini-crew asked him to become their Leader and having developed strong leadership in the Troop he did so. Again in 1966 it was off to the 5th National Moot (the year of the train strike) at Parksville, B.C. and 1967 at the Scout Pavillon at Man and his World in Montreal and was also the year he received the Medal of Merit.

1970 saw him at the 2nd Arctic & Northern Jamboree at Churchill, Manitoba working with Physical Arrangements and returning for the 6th National Moot at Birdshill Park in Manitoba. The 13th World Jamboree was held in Japan and once again he was off to work as Quartermaster of the Canadian Contingent. 1974 appeared on the horizon and a Deputy Camp Chief was needed for the 8th National Moot at Camp Samac and there he was again. Relaxing a bit in 1978 he became part of the Rocky High Contingent to attend the 8th National Moot at Pincher Creek, Alberta and is now serving on the 1982 World Invitational Moot committee.

He has his Troop and Crew Woodbadge and has served on many Woodbadge Training courses both in the National Capital Region and at Blue Springs. Although he is a firm believer in the Program side of Scouting he has still found time to work at District Scoutmaster, Regional Rover Coordinator, Camping Committee and Programme Policy & Resource Committee as well as the Woodbadge and Scouters Reunions. In his spare time he is employed by the Canada Department of Labour as its Forms Manager. In 1979 he received his 30 year Long Service Pin and that is a long time to be associated with the 2nd Ottawa.
