Charles Lamb once said to another person, "I hate that man." "How can you hate him when you don't know him?" asked his friend. "That's just it," replied Lamb. "Of course I couldn't hate him if I really knew him."

I know that you don't go around hating people but I'll bet dollars to donuts there are many folks you'd like if you only know them better. What's more, I'll bet other dollars that you wish you were more expert at getting along with people. Right? O.K. then, let's see what we can do about it.

We'll put our study of Friendship on a basis broad enough to get down to paydirt and include casual acquaintances. The clue appears to be "getting to know people" so let's see what people are like. You ask " How can you do that when we all know that everybody's different?" So they are - in some ways but they are all alike too. In some ways people will never change so we'll just talk about the things we are sure of. Let's get at what I mean this way.

MOST PEOPLE ARE NOT "SCHMARDT" even if "oldt"

"Ve gits doozoon oldt undt doolade schmardt" is a true old saying, but it is an understatement for most of us because we never get smart. The great majority of us cannot analyze and plan so we make mistakes and do things we never expected to do. That is why we need friends we can trust to talk things over with. That's why we say that two heads are better than one. If you want friends be ready to listen to troubles and lend a hand. Be patient. If people have confidence in you the basis of friendship exists.

WE ARE JOINERS.

We all want to be on the winning side, to feel that we are part of some-thing big and important. That may be because in a way we realize our inadequacies and look for strength in union. It is easier to make friends once you realize that most other people want to make friends too.

WE WANT TO APPEAR WELL in the eyes of others.

Very few humans are so low that they have no ambition. We all want to uphold a certain amount of dignity so your clue here is to treat people as individuals even if you know that they are all alike. That's the way you like to be treated isn't it? You like to be built up with a pat on the back every time you give a good talk or pull off a good part in the programme. So do others. We all want praise, Flattery, attention, a kind word, affection. So pour on a little oil once in a while just so long as it's good oil.

Incidentally when people boast to you they are actually complimenting you. They are telling you that you are important enough that they want to appear well to you.

WE WANT AN EXAMPLE to live up to.

Since few of us have very strong opinions about anything we go along with the crowd and take our lead from some one else. If you are the fellow who sets the example you will have many friends. It is human nature to look up. We look up mentally too because we all wish that we could be a little more like some one else. So do your Dest to pass on a little inspiration once in a while. It catches friends like honey attracts flies or Marilyn Monroe attracts box - office customers.

Well, we've "come a far piece" since we began to talk about getting to know people better. What have we learned? Just this. If we want to make friends it look as though we must understand people and realize that in the most important ways we are all alike. Some of the unchangeable things we have in common are that we are all handicapped in some way; we are not all brilliant; we all want friends; we all want to look big; we all want an example to live up to.

The next time you feel inclined to "blow your top" or "let someone have it" just remember that you too, are not perfect, nor smart; nor self sufficient; that you want to look well in this person's eyes. Then think of the example that you yourself look up to. Be humble and try to be worthy of your friends.

Are you selling the SIZZLE?

If you have difficulty in selling your Rovers on getting down to the meat and potatoes of Rovering, perhaps you have overlooked selling the sizzle. No, it isn't a new kind of badge or hiking aid. Here's how it is. What makes people buy? Elmer Wheeler says it is the sizzle. Hidden in everything that is sold is one or more sizzles, so all you've got to do to sell an idea or anything else, is find the hidden sizzle and sell that! Are you still with me?

It's the sizzle that sells the steak! What happens when a waiter walks through with a sizzling steak? First you hear it....then you see it....then you smell it - and that steak has dealt a triple blow to your emotions.

"Now, hidden in everything you sell, hidden in every personality, is a sizzle. The sizzle is the emotional side of what you sell. The steak is the factual side. For example:

"Please help the blind" is the usual sign you see. But a blind man I came across the other day had a sizzle. A sign sitting next to him read, "It is Spring. I am blind". Business boomed! (From "Selling the Sizzle", the Simplicity Gyrator for August, 1953).

Look for the sizzle in your programme and sell it! Is it the love of adventure, or curiosity or ambition? If you want to call it the selling point or the motivation, go ahead.....but get that sizzle heard!

THE QUEST OF THE YOUNGER BROTHER

The fourth Scout Law is "A Scout is a friend to all, and a brother to every other Scout, no matter to what nation, creed or class the other belong."

The implications here are tremendous for here is the basis of world peace. We will not live to see that day, but the practical application of friendship in even a small locality can bring about results which are well worth the effort involved. To me this is the SIZZLE in Rovering.

"Tackling the tough job of training myself to be friendly to alleven to the unfriendly; seeking out and emphasizing the points on which we agree, and leaving differences of outlook and opinion to perish from neglect. Tackling the job of training my younger brothers in the Movment, and outside, to catch from me the torch of Scouting. Learning about the principles of character formation in them so that my teaching may be adapted to their capabilities. Learning more and more about Scoutcraft, and the Scout Law, so that I may incite them by my example, as well as by my instruction to catch the joy of the game of Scouting"

The following activities are suggested as a guide to an interesting programme and will increase interest in the Quest of the younger Brother.

1. Study the advances made in Scoutcraft by getting speaders on up-to- date equipment and ideas.

- 2. Read and discuss Wolf Cubs Handbook, Scouting for Boys. Cubmasters First Year, Scoutmasters First Year and other books available.
- 3. Keep in contact with your Local Association and attend District activities.
- 4. Arrange joint activities with the Troop or Pack.
- 5. Hold joint meetings and socials with other Crews to encourage Squires.
- 6. Take preliminary training courses in Cub and Scout Leadership.
- 7. Listen to speakers from Y.M.C.A., Big Brothers, Amity, Salvation Army, etc., to learn what other organizations are doing for the younger brother.
- 8. Arrange lecture demonstrations on:
 - a) The Patrol system and how to help Patrol Leaders without interfering with their responsibility and freedom of action.
 - b) The Scout Laws how to teach them so that they are realities in the Scout's daily life.
 - c) The Badge system, with special reference to the value of eachone in character training.
 - bd) Games- the place of each in character training.
 - e) The elementary principles of psychology as regards boys of Cub and Scout age, from the practical point of view and with reference to the actual programme of the Pack or Troop concerned.
- 9. Promote study for the Wood Badge or other Gilwell Training.
- 10. Training Rover Instructors.
- 11. Help in special test work locally.
- 12. Run Toy Repair Shop.
- 13. Form a Round Table of Rovers who have adopted this quest pledge to help each other in perplexities and difficulties.
- 14. Form a Flying Squad of stop gap leaders to fill temporary vacancies.
- 15. Arrange visits of foreign Scouts and Rovers and do some international travelling.


- 16. Correspond with a Rover Crew in some other country.
- 17. Help to create more Crews by selling the idea to fellows in other Churches.
- 18. Encourage Progress Badge study along the lines of this quest.
- 19. Take senior Scouts on hikes and Moots.
- 20. Assist your local Scout Swimming Club.
- 21. Offer assistance at Scout Apple Day , Hobby Fairs and Local Parades.
- 22. Arrange some interesting annual event for Troops in your locality, run the event, judge it and award prizes. Such an event might be a day-long hike with events in signalling, coeking, etc.
- 23. Arrange tours to historic sites for Cubs and Scouts. Provide the guides and supervision necessary.
- 24. Make a film or set of slides to be used in your Local Association to show how Rovers serve their Younger Brothers.
- 25. Make films or slides for training purposes showing how to do things like light fires, break the colours, make camp gadgets, etc.

TONY WALLBANK

It was in early March 1979 that I finally encountered Tony Wallbank. I was attending my first planning meeting for the Buckskin and Feathers Moot, and Tony was the Advisor. Looking back on that sea of unfamiliar faces, Tony's is the one which seems to remain the most prominent in my mind. It could be because of his bright red beard and impish grin, or it could be because he was trying to convince me to be part of his early morning bread and milk run at the moot. In either case, little did I suspect that I would be sitting in his icy cold, "pleasantly perfumed" barn less than two years later, calmly listening to his life story while he shovelled manure into a wheel-barrow!

Tony Wallbank's life is a study in dedication to the Scouting Movement, from the crazy antics of his youth, to the foundation and editing of Rovering Magazine. It is definitely time Tony received some praise, for not only is he a fine example of the ideals that Rovering represents, but he is an outstanding contributor to the betterment of the Scouting movement. By writing this article about Tony, it is my hope that I will be able to acquaint you with him, so that he will cease to be merely a name on a page to so many of the Magazine's readers, and become, to you, more of the vibrant personality Tony's friends know him to be.

Tony Wallbank first became interested in the Scouting Movement when he was seven years old. He happened to be in the Plattsville Church basement where Scouts were climbing up a rope suspended from the ceiling. The adventure of it all appealed to Tony, and he decided to join the Wolf Cub Pack.

Tony was a hard worker, and by 1959 he had attained most of the Cub badges. Tony then decided to move on to Boy Scouts. He joined the Scout troop two stars, symbolizing that he now had both his eyes open. (For those who have gone through the Guiding Movement, two stars are equivalent to your Brownie wings.) Tony was the second person in Plattsville to be awarded the Leaping Wolf which replaced the two stars, and was a remembrance of what he had attained in Cubs.

In 1962, Tony's family moved to Galt, and he left the Movement for about five months. Then he was invited to join the Sixth Galt Sea Scouts, a great honour, since the Troop was already full to capacity. During his time in Scouts, Tony went to "many and various Scout rendezvous", the height of which was a week in Algonquin Park. In 1964, he earned his Bushmen's Thong, which is awared to a Scout after he obtains a specific number of badges having to do with woodmanship. Tony also attained his Second Class before advancing to the First Galt Rovers in 1966. At that time, a potential Rover needed to become a Queen's Scout, and earn his Junior St. John's Ambulance before he could be released from his Squireship. Needless to say, Tony attained both these honours.

The year in which Tony was invested, 1967, was one of the most eventful ones in his Rovering life. Not only did he and his Crew attend the Centennial Moot in Ottawa, but they became the Honour Guard for Queen Elizabeth II. During this time period, Tony helped form the Sixth Galt Rover Crew. "they're the best Crew in the world," Tony told me, and then he proceeded to give their Crew Cheer.

Yet, 1967 was by no means a totally serious year for Tony in Rovering. Tony fondly recalls a certain weekend when his Crew took part in storming Fort George in Niagara-on-the-Lake, where they took down the Ensign, and hoisted the Rover Flag. They also locked the guards in the jail, and terrorized the tourists. In spite of all this, or perhaps because of it, Tony's first love entered his life shortly thereafter. Dorothy Burchill and the song "I Think We're Alone Now" are cherished illustrations from Tony's imaginary scrapbook. However, all goood things must come to an end. In 1969, many of the members of Tony's Crew were getting married, and the Crew's numbers began to decrease rapidly. But Tony remained with the Crew, and, as is usual, would not let such things as a lack of old members and the apathy of new ones keep him from attending various moots. Tony's voice betrayed his pride as he told me how, at one moot, he and one other Crew member had beaten Oakville, a fifteen member Crew, for nearly all the awards.

Tony's mood changed, a humorous glint appeared in his eyes, the corners of his mouth moved into a wide, impish grin, and he spoke in a conspiritorial sort of tone. "I'm going to tell you about the fantastic Crew weekends that we spent together." Then Tony actually began to chuckle to himself over what he considers to be his masterpiece. A certain Squire in Tony's Crew, (who shall remain nameless) had to crawl, while blindfolded, through a public washroom, into a cubicle, and feel around until he came into contact with a familiar object. Next, he had to put his hand into the bowl, whereupon he found and object approximately six inches long floating in the water. The unfortunate Squire was then told to squeeze the object as hard as he could, after which he was to bring it up to his nose and sniff it. Knowing the diabolical minds of many Rovers the way most of us do, I expect the Squire was quite relieved to discover that it was only a banana.

Tony became quickly serious however, as he reminiced about his twenty-two year old sponsor, who, not only taught about life and working in the "outside world" but set a good example as well. There was a long pause as Tony tried to express his gratitude to his sponsor for all that he had done for him. Tony then paid him one of the highest compliments of all, by saying, that all Rovers should have a sponsor such as he had been lucky enough to. Tony firmly believes that the younger Rovers need someone to look up to, and trust. Although it is traditional to humilate your Squires, it is important to set a good example for them to follow, to extend the hand of friendship to someone who needs it. Tony himself is currently sponsoring a Rover from Cambridge.

Tony's next set of infamous Rovering escapades were direct results of his purchase of a red and white jeepster in early 1970. In Tony's own words, "The women would just go nuts over me at moots, since jeepsters were still a novelty then. No doubt about it, I was Moot King, with an excellant choice of Princesses!" Tony was so confident of his new-found appeal to the opposite sex, that he started a contest with a Rovering buddy. Eddie Mitchell, to see who could take out the most girls in one month. Eddie won by one date, the score fourteen to thirteen in his favour. However, Tony won a sub-contest by taking five girls out in one weekend. To top it all off, he only had to pay for two of them, since the other three treated him!

This cavalier image was maintained by Tony well into 1971, when he and Donny McLeod were at Blue Springs Training Camp, for leaders. Tony and Donny, ("my best Rovering buddy") were putting together a slide presentation, and they needed a picture with a girl in it. Thus Tony nabbed the first female he saw, and dipped her "gracefully" while the rest of the Crew crowded around. The picture was taken, and the girl, Carol Titchener, was allowed to stand up again. She gave Tony her name and address, and asked him to send her a copy of the picture. Then Tony walked out of her life, apparently forever.

A few monthe later, Tony and Donny were on their way out West to the National Rover Conference (Naroco). Tony's first glimpse of the Rocky Mountains filled him with an indescribable awe, and his spirits seemed tosoar with the clouds. Tony was inspired to write,

and since he just happened to have Carol's address with him, he wrote to her. The letter was a masterpiece of eloquence and beauty. It spoke of all the things that mattered to Tony, of freedom and Scouting. When Tony returned to Ontario, he escorted Carol to her brother's wedding. However, Tony was also escorting three other girls to various functions, and the romance seemed doomed. But Carol refused to give up hope, and in 1972, Tony left the Indian Summer Moot to go and propose to her. Needless to say, she accepted. After discerning that his single life was over, Tony returned to the Moot. This was to much for my rather prominent romantic spirit. "Tony, how could you?" I demanded. "What was more important to you, Carol, or Rovers?" But Tony soothed my ruffled sense of what was right = and proper in such circumstances, by assuring me that he left Carol with no doubt in her mind as to what was more important to him. "That's good," I said, falling into his trap. "Rovers, of course." (But he smiled as he said it.) Just in case you're still concerned about Tony's lack of romanticism, this will calm your fears. Carol and Tony were married the following August, and hiked through the Rockies for their honeymoon. Thus the Mountains that brought them together were the site of the beginning of their life together. Now that's romantic Tony!

Marriage did not interfere with Tony's involment in the movement. In 1974, Tony was the chairman of the Green Acres Region Rover Round Table. It was when he and Donny McLeod began to send out the minutes of the meetings that Rovering Magazine was born. Tony was also a sub-camp chief of an all-male Rover section with Donny. He was a member of the South Waterloo Rover Service Team where he ran training courses and other activities.Tony was the advisor for Moot '75 and filled the same role in 1979 for the 4th Provincial Moot. He was also on the district council and camp committee that year.

In spite of all this Rovering, Tony has truly "settled down" He sold his infamous jeep long ago, and used the money for a down payment on thirteen acres of land. "It was an old gravel pit, and useless for farming," Tony recalls, "But it had a picturesque view of the Nith River." Many Rovers helped Tony and Carol construct their first house and barn. These were finally finished in 1978, at which time time Tony sold them and bought his present seventythree acre farm. If Tony has his way, the farm will be as large as he can make it. As a child, Tony had often dreamed, not only of his own farm, but of driving his own team of horses. Now he has fulfilled both of these dreams. Tony's "menagerie" consists of four draft horses six cattle, three cats, two ducks, two rabbits and, his main farm business interest, about one hundred hogs. On top of all his farm chores, Tony works in a family business (P.J. Wallbank) which employs nearly seventy people. In his own words, Tony is "fairly busy", to say the least. However, he always finds time to spend with his son Teddy, who was born in 1977. Teddy already shows the makings and ambitions of a true farmer. The Wallbanks are expexting a new brother or sister for Teddy in June.


Throughout the entire interview, Tony kept stressing all that his friends have done for him during his life. They helped him in everything, and Tony feels that he couldn't have gotten along without them. It seems to that in order to have such wonderful, caring reliable friends, you must be a very special person yourself. Tony Wallbank is not only special, he is much, much more. He is a true friend.

Tony's contributions to the Rovering Movement are an intricate part of his life. Certainly, the Movement could have existed without Tony, and Tony without the Movement, but something vital would have been missing from both.

I believe that what binds Tony to Rovering is an elusive quality within him which defies description, a quiet eloquence that consists not so much of what he says, but what he does for those around him. And isn't helping others part of what Rovering is all about?

Happy Birthday Tony. On behalf of your readers everywhere, thank you for your dedication to the Scouting Movement. We hope that you will be able to share your insights, and your friendship with us for many years to come.


