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## GOD Stuff

As I write this I'm still suffering a bit of jet lag after a tour of Europe, the highlight of which was a six hour sit at the Passion Play in Oberammergau in Germany. (They break it with a three hour lunch, but it is still a long sit.) Many things to see, especially churches.

Ever vigilant to spot Scouts I managed to spot quite a number from Great Britain, Canada, Germany and the one that really caught my eye was the one from Hungary that I saw in Salzburg Austria. All part of the brotherhood of Scouts or as my parents began to refer to it as the worlds' biggest fraternity.

But I digress from religion for a bit. What does a seminarian do on a trip to Europe. I saw many churches and many other sights not to be forgotten or a least I hope not when I get all my pictures developed.

After an all night flight to London the first thing we did was head to 8t. Paul's for church. kle: were told that it was to be a service of morning prayer, but it turned out to be a Communion service to which all were welcome to participate in, no matter what denomination they were from OF where they came from in the world. I amazed myself by being able to awake during the sermon; stay remember, that I had not slept since the day before. It was a beautiful service and gave me some ideas to try to use next year when I get my own church?

One must remember that many of the churches in Europe are also museums. This did not stop the people at Westminster from stopping all the visitors to join in "the prayer that unites all Christians", the Lord's prayer. Going from England to France we visited Sacre Cour at 9:30 pm. Even at that late hour this church was literally packed inside and out. People having fellowship, but also many people praying. This church was a real people place. Devotion was not lost in the midst of the tourists.

The highlight of the trip was yet to come. The Passion Play which tells of the story of Christ in song, play and panorama. After the play I went to a bilingual, international serivce at the Lutheran church not far from the Theater. The service was both interesting and meaningful. People from all over the world coming together to pray. To make the service truly international a pastor from each of Canada. the United States and the host pastor who described himself Estonian Swede as a Latvian, serving in Germany gave Communion together. When we worshipped we were all one.

One has to remember the history of Europe. A continent torn apart by war and just now coming together to the delight of many people in Germany. (Just don't ask them about Wartburg and Trabant cars, but that's another story).

The memories of the war are never far away, even when one visits churches. One of the last things that we did was to visit the city of Worms. Here we went into the small protestant church which had been almost totally destroyed in the war.

At the back of the church were pictures of the ruins. The most memorable was one which showed the pastor conducting services in the ruins of the church. The building was a ruin, but the faith of the people remained strong. Today the church has been rebuilt and looks much the same as it did before it was bombed.

Faith has allowed the people of Oberammergau to conduct their play for centuries as faith allowed the people of the Magnuskirche to rebuild their church after the war. Faith is that thing in our lives which gives us hope for the future and the world to come.
