

It starts with Scouts.

Long Point Provincial Park

Looking for somewhere to take your Group this summer? I recently had the chance to spend the day at Long Point with non-other than your editor John McCuaig this past spring. Long Point is a unique park to be enjoyed in all seasons. It is a slim strip of land about 40km's in length that juts out into Lake Erie. If you like birds this is the place to go and see them, especially in the spring and fall. The park is located about a ½ hour west of the town of Port Dover, Ontario. John and I visited the park this past April. Binoculars in hand, we decided to start by exploring the beach for birds. It didn't take long before we spotted some turkey vultures flying overhead that had recently come back from their migration down south.



If you go to Long Point in the summer be sure to bring your swim suit as the beach is sandy and the water warm for swimming. You might also enjoy camping in the park. There are lots of camping sites to rent for a night or more.

After a while we decided to go inland as there weren't many birds hanging out along the beach that day. To our

surprise there were lots of birds taking shelter within the park. We spotted a yellow bellied sapsucker high up in a pine tree. As we meandered through the park we observed killdeer, northern flickers, tree swallows, chickadees, eastern pewee, dark-eyed junco, robins, a great blue heron, cardinals and **numerous** red winged blackbirds (RWB's). The highlight was seeing a northern harrier flying over the marsh.

The inland side of the park is quite a different landscape from the outside perimeter. I was shocked at how much of the shoreline was overgrown with Phragmites (also called Reed Grass). Phragmites is an invasive species of grass that is literally taking over many shorelines in the Province of Ontario. Where it grows nothing



else does. It chokes out all native vegetation and is very hard to get rid of. grass is an ornamental grass and does not offer any food value for birds and other wildlife so the area where it invades becomes a sterile landscape lacking in the native plants like bulrushes, high bush cranberry, goldenrod and milkweed. On the inland side of the park, we were lucky to see a number of waterfowl including bufflehead, horned grebes, and surprisingly a couple of common loons.



If you go to Long Point make sure to check out the Old Cut Research Station and Visitor Centre located just outside of the park on Old Cut Boulevard.

The centre is open to the public in the spring and fall. From April-June and August-November you can watch bird banding demonstrations from 9-12 and it's a nice spot to eat your lunch and watch the variety of birds coming to the nearby feeders.







THE FIVE-PIECE CAMP AROUND NOVA SCOTIA AWARD



Purpose: Requirements For Each Piece:	To encourage the exploration of NS, as well as the better utilization of our Scout Camps. Though it is not a requirement to camp on a Scouts Canada property, the NS Council has a number of really great camps! \[\begin{align*} \text{Camp for at least one night within the area with your section or group (Camps before Feb 1, 2017 don't count);} \[\begin{align*} \text{Take a picture of participants earning the crest, with a landmark of the sight, i.e. a sign, lodge, lake or cabin;} \[\begin{align*} \text{Send this photo into the Maritime Service Centre along with the quantity of crests you'd like. It's important to note that multiple sections of the crest cannot be ordered at one time.} \end{align*}
Scouting Properties Within Each Piece:	
Southern Camper:	Mush-a-Mush, Pierce Park [Digby, Yarmouth, Shelburne, Queens, Lunenburg]
Valley Camper:	Connell Lake, Lower Lake 60/Camp Hiawatha, Sunken Lake [Annapolis, Kings, West Hants]
Central Camper:	Scout Island, Harold T. Barrett, Camp Lone Cloud, Camp Harris, Camp Nedooae, Malagash, Camp Impeeza [East Hants, HRM, Colchester, Cumberland]
Northern Camper:	Camp Rodrick [Pictou, Antigonish, Guysborough]
Cape Breton Camper:	Camp Carter [All of Cape Breton Island]
Cost & Size:	Each section of the crest will be sold for \$2.50 from the Maritime Service Centre and will be a whopping 12" by 4" in size
