

Hiking in Transitional Weather

March has got to be the most challenging month to hike in, especially this year. After hiking in very cold temperatures this winter with a lot of snow on the ground we now find ourselves in situations with ice on the trail combined with flooding and now mud. This makes for very challenging conditions.

A couple of weeks ago in mid -March I had plans to lead a hike for the Toronto Bruce Trail club on the Humber Valley Heritage Trail in Bolton along with hike leader in training Kirby McCuaig (your magazine editor). As I was getting ready I received a frantic call from Kirby telling me that downtown Bolton was flooded. There had been a major ice jam along the Humber River. This was right where our hike was supposed to start from. We rushed out to Bolton and found out that in fact the flooding was not right in the centre of town but about a of block east. Our hike could go ahead as planned. We had done a pre-hike of the trail a few weeks prior but had not had a chance to check out the trail in the past couple of days. We were in for a surprise. Our group of 10 hikers started out along the trail which turned

out to be sheer ice. Incredibly only one person did not have icers. Kirby had a spare in his pack and happily lent them to the one hiker who did not have a pair. Those of us who had Micro-spikes had no problem trekking along the icy trail. Unfortunately those who did not have the spikes but less expensive versions of icers didn't fare so well slipping and sliding around. After about an hour we decided that it was too dangerous to continue so we turned around and went back. As we had shortened the hike we decided to go into the town and check out the ice jam. 5 excavators were being used to remove huge chunks of ice from the Humber River. Around 200 people were forced to evacuate their homes and find temporary shelter in a nearby community centre.

If you are thinking of hiking in March or April a good pair of traction devices is essential! These can be purchased at any number of outdoor stores. There are many different styles to choose from but the best ones have spikes underneath. Icers with

styles to choose from but the best ones have spikes underneath. Icers with spikes are not cheap but well worth it if it prevents you from experiencing a fall. In March the days are getting longer but it's not summertime yet. Remember to bring your flashlight with you in case you get caught out after dark. Dress in layers as it can still get cold in March, especially if you are hiking in the late afternoon. It's better to take off a couple of layers and put them in your backpack if you get too warm than to find yourself getting cold and not have anything to put on. Have a couple of hand warmers in your pack. You can use one and switch it back and forth between your two hands to warm them up. Don't forget to put other essentials like a compass, whistle, matches, first aid kit, pocket knife, small cushion, snacks and water in your pack. Spring is a great time of the year to hike without the mosquitos or the summer heat so get out there!

Keeping It Fresh, Engaging and Fun



With 5 years under our belt working with the Bruce Trail Conservancy (BTC) making Bluebird and Wood Duck Nesting Boxes, it was time for a new service project. This time we partnered with the BTC to re-supply the Mason Bee Tubes for their native bee project.

The Toronto Section of the BTC has been putting up Mason Bee Tubes throughout the properties it manages. Ontario has over 400 species of native bees, but the most well-known bee is the Honey which originates Europe and it's not a native bee. A major portion of our domestic bees don't congregate in a hive, but are solitary bees. For species, the Female is looking for the right location to lay her eggs and leave them food made from nectar, which she seals in a chamber she builds.

With the help of our guest speaker, George Lennon from the BTC, our Cub Scouts, Scouts, Venturer Scouts and Rover Scouts worked together to roll paper tubes to be placed in the BTC Mason Bee Tube PVC pipes in the field. We turned old newspaper with the help of wooden dowels and glue sticks into environmental action. BTC volunteers will now replace the last year's tubes with ours in May on the property they are managing.

Whereas the bird nesting boxes were a project for our Venturer Company and then with our returning Rovers, the Bee Tubes were a project for all four sections of our group. An opportunity for all to work together on a Service Project for our environment. This allowed our Venturer and Rover Scouts to mentor the Cub Scouts and Scouts and the younger sections to bond with our older members.

Consider partnering with other organizations to improve your group impact of the projects in your program.

Grassi Lakes Trail, Canmore, Alberta – Bike and Hike



Traditional thinking leads to planning a trip and packing the car and heading off to the trail. Back in 2016 when I was visiting my nephew in Canmore, Alberta there wasn't a car rental available, so it was time to think outside of the box. Previously that week I had ridden to from Canmore to Banff and back, so riding to the trail head seemed like the right solution.

The Good news, the Grassi Lakes Trail offers a spectacular view of Canmore, the Bad news, spectacular views are offered from the top of a mountain and I was planning to ride up to the park's parking lot.




The trip began by simply riding through the town of Canmore, then the ascending started. The plan included a mid-way stop at the site of the 1988 Calgary Winter Olympics Cross-country Skiing Facility. The current facility is a legacy of the games. Now the park has a dual personality, Cross-country skiing in the winter months and mountain biking in the rest of the year.

Within the Day Lodge are displays of memorabilia both donated and loaned from various Winter Olympic Games, including a torch used during the relay of the 2010 Vancouver Games

After resting up at the Nordic Centre, I continued the climb to the parking lot of the Grassi Lakes Trail Head where a locked up the rented bike and started my hike.

For the hike itself you have two choices, following the access road to the top or a traditional trail. Either way you do it the result is the same. A spectacular view of the Canmore and the mountains that surround it.



When planning your next trip spice it up a little and leave the car at home. A number of years ago I challenged our Venturer Company to take the bus to Zoo Moot. Years later they still take the bus to camp, it provides them a sense of independence and they arrive at the moot earlier than when their parents would be able to drop them off. My next challenge for them is this summer to take the GO Train to the start of our loaded cycle tour of the Niagara Region.

Back in the 70's the mate of my crew Marty Lalonde of 3rd Newtonbrook told us of his experience called Ringing Rails where Rovers took the train to a Canadian National Moot. 

Basic premise

Each Company is to create a chili dish that best uses tools and equipment that they can ordinarily bring to camp. Fitting to the theme of "Camp California" is

Rules

- No preparation cooking is allowed. That is: no marinating, pre-cooking, or chopping is to be done before the official start.
- Any and all garbage must be disposed of (including hauling it home from camp)
- Food prepared should be considered something you would cook for a normal camp meal.
- Alcohol even for cooking purposes is
- Interference with other teams is highly ill-advised.

Tasting rules

- Food offered should be in quantities only enough for the judges to get a good idea of overall taste. You are not feeding the judges; you are teaching yourselves to cook better food at camp.
- Bribes will be accepted.
- Naturally you should cook enough for both tasting and enough for your own dinners.
 Portions to be shared among other teams are encouraged (think "mini potluck").
- Judges will be presented with the Chili by the team at their scheduled time.


Judges' decisions are final.


To the winner go the spoils
