From July 19th to 29th Rovers from all over the world will come together in Dublin to take part in 11 days of hi adventure activities across the whole island of Ireland!

The moot will begin in Dublin where the opening ceremony will kick things off, after the ceremony you and your international patrol will be sent to one of the Moots trails scarred all over the island. You could be surfing in the west, hiking in the south, doing a service project in the north or sing and dancing with locals in the east. There is so many great adventures just waiting for you! After a few days on your trail everyone will be brought back to one central location to finish the remainder of the Moot! Don't worry there's tons of program and adventure still yet to happen. At Malahide Castle patrols and tribes will come together along with 5000 other Rovers from around the world to keep the spirit of the Moot going! Everyone is encouraged to travel before or after moot to see the rest of Ireland or to travel past the boundaries or the island. There is no limit to your adventure.





The theme for this Moot is le chéile (leh kay-la) which translates to 'together'. There is an old saying in the Irish language; “ní neart go cur le chéile” which means “there is no strength without unity”. The Moot will bring together thousands of Rovers from across the world, to share cultures, learn from each other and gain new skills. There programme is based on

collaboration allowing them to be inclusive, educational and adventurous. As Scouts, each of us can, and must, make a positive difference in the world; le chéile our impact will be greater. They aim to inspire the World’s Rover Scouts to act together to improve our world and their own local communities.

PURPLE MARTIN'S ON AMHERST ISLAND

On our way back from a weekend hiking trip in May of this year my hiking partner Kirby and I decided to take a ½ hour ferry boat from the town of Millhaven (near Kingston) to check out the birds on Amherst Island. We had heard that it was a great place to see birds so we had our binoculars and bird books in the car with us. Most of the Island is privately owned so much of the birding has to be done by the roadside. When we got to the island, we made a left-hand turn and headed over to the Kingston Field Naturalists Property located on the easternmost part of the Island. The 100-hectare conservation reserve is only open to members so we got out of the car and walked along the road to investigate the birds at the edge of the property. We weren't disappointed. To our surprise there were literally hundreds of tree swallows flying about. I had never seen so many. Alongside the edge of the property nesting boxes sat on top of every single



fencepost. Each one had been claimed by a tree swallow who was busy bringing nesting materials to make a nest inside the box or insects to feed their chicks. At the south end of the nature reserve we caught sight of a large number of purple martins flying around. They were going in and out of bird houses which sat high up off the ground. Purple martins are picky about where they live preferring man-made apartment style houses or gourds which must be placed a

certain height off the ground to protect them from predators like birds, mice, raccoons, cats etc. Sometimes a predator guard is placed on the pole to prevent raccoons or other animals from climbing up the pole and grabbing the birds inside the boxes. Purple martins are the largest in the swallow family. The male is a dark glossy purplish-blue. Females and juveniles are gray below. It was such a treat to see so many purple martins flying overhead. Purple martin numbers are in decline recently, partly because of competition from starlings. If you are interested in seeing wintering birds go to Amherst Island in January or February. A local merchant informed us that they had a bumper crop of voles last year which attracted large numbers of Snowy Owls. If you go make sure to pack a lunch as there is not a single coffee shop and the one restaurant on the island is not always open. After driving the perimeter of the island, we made our way back to the ferry and headed home.



Directions: To get to Amherst Island, drive about 20km west of Kingston on Bath Road (aka Loyalists Parkway or Highway 33) to the town of Millhaven. Follow the signs to the Amherst Island ferry dock. The ferry departs Millhaven on the half-hour and the island on the hour starting from 6a.m. until 2a.m. Expect to pay around \$9.00 fee for a round-trip crossing per vehicle. Jamboree on the Trail (JOTT)

David Wiebe and Jamboree on the Trail committee members have been offering an opportunity to Unite Scouting across the world one day a year with JOTT, regardless of the resources or the ability of individual members or groups. The event simply requires a member to hike anywhere they want on the same day as every other member of the Scouting community.



Our first group hike, last year, involved only our Venturer Scouts and parents in Rouge Valley Park in Toronto, our second hike this year involved a four sections hike near Limehouse, Ontario on the Bruce Trail.

Tessa Shelvey and I pre-hiked the trail near Limehouse where our first-year build of Bluebird boxes is still proving nesting opportunities for the local birds as part of the Bruce Trail Conservancy program. We wanted a hike that which would interest all of our members and their parents and match their abilities. The hike included, hiking the Bruce Trail, a trail steeped in tradition and name recognition in southern Ontario, something fun for all ages, "The-Hole-in-the-Wall" a large crack in the escarpment to climb and crawl through, and historical significance to our group as one of the places our Bird Boxes and Bee Tubes are being placed. As a bonus and complete surprise to us the Halton Regional Fire

Department Team was practicing rappelling while we were there. They annually rescue hikers and others from the escarpment cliff face.

Starting from the Limehouse Conservation parking lot we hiked the Limehouse access trail to the junction with the main trail of the Bruce Trail, turned north west and followed it towards the village of Limehouse. Along the way we stopped at two historical sites of local industry where cement was produced from the limestone of the escarpment. The first site a restored kiln and the second a storage building for explosives from the 1800's. Cement produced in Limehouse went to fuel the expansion of Toronto and other towns and villages of the young province of Ontario.

Our final stop, before returning to the conservation area was the Tod Bales Meadowland Side Trail the site of our first Bluebird Nesting Boxes and the future location of our Mason Bee Tubes. We returned the way we came and enjoyed a group BBQ at the conservation area.

Return to Grassi Lakes Trail 2019, Canmore, Alberta



This past June Tessa and I took a trip back to Alberta to visit my nephew Josh Wilde (nee 3rd Newtonbrook Venturer Scouts) and his girlfriend Christine Nykolaichuk and to hike in Alberta, British Columbia and Montana.

This year's hike to Grassi Lakes involved the traditional drive from Canmore, dropping off a vehicle at the bottom of the trail and parking at the top. After dropping a vehicle in the lot, we continued above to the parking lot where climbers park to climb the cliff walls above the lakes. Caution the road is extremely rough and steep. We used all wheel drive and drove extremely slowly as the road is washboard on the side of a cliff.

The hike above the lakes begins with a steep decent down from the parking area. Those that are interested in climbing the faces of the cliffs begin their hike here as it the shortest route to the cliff bases.

After a 10 to 15-minute walk down there is one cliff wall with petroglyphs. Unfortunately, the petroglyphs are within easy reach and over the years of hikers touching them, they have begun to fade. Please reframe form touching them so they will be there for future hikers to enjoy.

Spring Time in Frontenac Provincial Park



Spring time in Frontenac Provincial Park is an excellent time for hiking, backpacking and canoe tripping. This past May I had an opportunity to check off another item on my Bucket List.

Located about an hour north of Kingston, Ontario, Frontenac has hiking, backpacking, canoeing cross-country skiing, snowshoeing and winter camping. Yes, it has in all. Tessa and I hiked just two of the many trails available, Doe Lake and Big Salmon Lake.

The park is open year-round, important for those looking for campsites past Thanksgiving and those interested in winter camping. There are 22 lakes to canoe (portaging required

between most lakes) and 48 campsites total for backpackers and canoeists, though no group sights. For larger groups reserve sights next to each other.

Tessa had been to Frontenac and my Brother-in-law's sister Julie seems to go once a month, so I had to see for myself why it held such promise. After reviewing the park map and hiking the trails one thought kept coming to mind over and over. If you are a backpacker or canoe tripper it seems that this park was built specifically for you. The lakes and trails interconnect perfectly for designing your own trips. The trails loop and interconnect and the portages lead from one lake to the other. You design your own trip to suit your own level of comfort and level of challenge.

Tessa and I after our drive wanted a short hike to get our legs warmed up, so after checking in at the visitor centre, we started with the 3 km Dow Lake Trail. The Ontario Parks website describes it as 1 to 1 ½ hours easy to moderate. We took about 2 hours to complete the trail as we had lunch at the lookout above Doe Lake. A great tranquil view and a bench to sit on while you eat your lunch (see photo above).

Once our legs were warmed up, we drove to the trail head for the Big Salmon Lake Loop. At 19 km in length we just wanted a pleasant hike and but weren't looking to take advantage for the overnight backpacking trip the trail offered. The trail promised a continuous view of the lake and it didn't fail as it wandered back and forth from in the forest to overlooking the lake. There are a number of small ponds along the trail separate form the lake, especially during the spring months after the snow melt and spring rains. At one-point Tessa whimpered to me that she heard what was most certainly was a turtle diving into the pond after hearing our approach. As we quietly as we



could we approached the pond for a closer look, to our amazement we saw over 24 turtles sunbathing on various logs and clumps of grass within the pond. There were 13 turtles on one log.! It would seem we had stumbled upon one of the prime spring time gathering locations in the park.

Later returning along the trail we would experience our first "Love Knot", as spring was in the air in Frontenac for garter snakes as well.

We didn't complete the entire loop, we just wanted to get the lay of the land. We defiantly picked the right day to check out the park. I'll remember the turtle sighting for years to come.

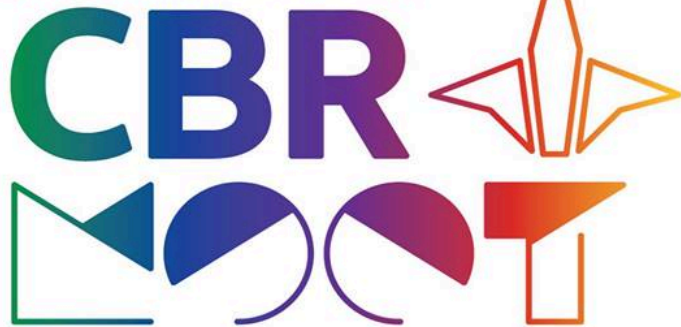
