It starts with Scouts.

Hiking in Waterton Lakes National Park after the 2017 fire

In June of this year my hiking partner Kirby and I had the opportunity to hike in Waterton Lakes National Park in southern Alberta. This was a very different hiking experience for us as Waterton Lakes had a major forest fire in September 2017 resulting in 70% of the forested area being lost. The fire was caused by a lightning strike. The park had been hit by fires in the past but none were quite the scale of this one. The fire burned 38,000 hectares including 20,000 hectares in Waterton Lakes Park. Over 80% of Waterton's hiking trail network was damaged. The federal government invested \$29.9 million to help restore the park. When Kirby and I decided to explore the park in June of this year (2019) we weren't aware of the devastating fire the park was recovering from. Tourism had been at its peak in 2017 at 569,000 visitors. Some local residents said the fire was nature's way of slowing things down because they felt there were too many tourists in the park which were having a negative impact on the environment.



Many of the hiking trails in the park have been permanently closed due to the fire. We decided to hike a 12km trail called the Lakeshore trail which would take us 6km south to the U.S. border of Montana and then we would hike back the same way. The trail was described as fairly easy. We had gotten a late start that day and made our way to the trail head around noon. The trail climbed up to a scenic lookout over Upper Waterton Lake. To our surprise the wildflowers were in full bloom. Passing hikers who lived in the area told us that the park was experiencing an explosion of plant growth underneath the dead trees since the fire occurred two years ago. It was a scene I had never experienced before. All of the trees looked like black matchsticks but underneath the dead trees was a carpet of green interspersed with beautiful spring flowers. It was a unique experience.



The trail turned out to be anything but easy. It was up and down all the way to the U.S. border of Montana. I made the mistake of saying how bug free it was until we got close to the border and the mosquitos came out in full force. We made it to the border and took a few pictures. A large sign indicated that if we chose to go any farther, we would have to call the border control and let them know that we were entering the U.S. As it was very buggy, we decided to head back. Along the way we saw a lot of bear scat on the trail but much to my dismay no actual bears. We finally made it back to our car at 6:30.

The lakeshore trail had been much more challenging than we had thought it would be but the problem of course is that we are comparing the trails in Alberta to the trails in Ontario. A fairly easy trail in Alberta is comparable to a moderate hike in Ontario. To our delight we did see an actual bear on the road the next day when we were driving out of the park.

Waterton Lakes National Park is located in the southwest corner of Alberta, Canada. It borders Glacier National Park in Montana, Unites States.



Editor's Note: Tessa has a list of animals she wants to see in the wild, thankfully we saw the Black Bear from the safety of our rental vehicle. From the amount of scat, we saw on the trail, that was close enough. Remember your Bear Bell and Spray. In case you're wondering, I'm standing in Canada and Tessa's in the U.S. in the photo above. Hiking from one country to another is now off my bucket list as is cycling from one country to another (completed previously in Europe)

Wapta Falls, Yoho National Park, British Columbia



Wapta Falls is located in Yoho National Park approximately 26 km west of Field, British Columbia and 36 km East of Golden, British Columbia on the southside of the Trans Canada Highway. Careful if you are coming from Field as there is no left-hand turning lane, Parks Canada recommends "Continue 3 km to the park west boundary, turn and come back".

Yoho and Glacier National Parks share the distinction of being Canada's second oldest National Parks as they were established on the same day, in 1886, one year after Banff National Park was established in 1885.

It's considered a short hike at 4.6 km (return), but the walk in from the parking lot doesn't prepare you for the ferocity of the water fall. The Kicking Horse River roars over the falls here. It is the highest falls on the Kicking Horse River at 30 metres. It made a great lunch stop for Tessa and I after a short stop in Field. 1.5 hours plus anytime you spend having lunch or taking photos.

What is amazing is how calm the river is directly below the roaring falls. A great location to have a lunch with a spectacular view. Pull up a log, pass out the sandwiches and relax.

It is important to check the Parks Canada website for park and trail closures. On the day we hiked Wapta Falls the nearby Takakkaw Falls trail was closed. Do your research and don't be disappointed as snow melts late in some areas in the mountains and then comes early in others and then there are bears on the trails which can also lead to closures.

The Grand River, South-western Ontario

Ever have an item stay on your bucket list longer than it should? For me it's paddling the Grand River. I have a VHS tape done by Channel 12 years ago. Yes, Virginia there really were video tapes prior to DVD's. Always thought it would be a nice summer activity, but it never progressed to an item on my calendar.

Finally, I can take it off my list as Tessa and I, plus friends took the plunge, well not really, we made will swamping the canoe!

We put in in Paris and canoed down river to the Brant Conservation Area. For those planning the trip, I recommend the book: Paddling the Grand River by the Grand River Conservation Authority with Jamie Kent. Its now in its Sixth Edition. It has been "Revised and Updated" so it probably more of an essential guide than my old VHS tape.

The river height is controlled by a number of dams along its length, but I still found it a little shallow for my liking early on from Paris. There are lots of rocks just below the surface. Our canoe received a few more scratches along the way, so I don't recommend cedar strip canoes for this trip. Good communication between the bow and stern is essential at least for your pride's sake (if not for your canoe's health).

Camping can be done from the 1st of May to the 15th of October at the conservation area.

Oh, and one more reason for me to do the Grand River this year, I'll be able to tell Kevin Callan next time I see him at the Outdoor Show, I paddled more than just the lake at my cottage.

The Grand River is a great introduction to Canoeing for those in your Company or Crew with little experience. It will enable them to practice with their canoeing partner. A great outing of the water on a warm day.

Tessa is already planning for next year and has a new route in mind.



(Any adults age 21+ must sign up to attend as staff if they are not attending as adult leadership with their unit.)

Important Information for all Applicants:

 Deposit is due at the time this form is completed. Reservations that do not have a paid deposit will not be processed. (Registration is a multiple step process.)

- The participant cost is \$525 per youth member and \$425 per adult for reservations made prior to April 30, 2020.
- Late participant reservations (after April 30, 2020) are \$625 per youth member and \$525 per adult.
- Staff reservations are \$275.
- Final payment is due April 30, 2020. Reservations made after April 30, 2020 require payment in full at time of reservation.
- All paid fees are non-refundable.
- All participants must be currently registered Venturers, Sea Scouts, or Scouts BSA.
- Tents, cots and all program equipment are provided.
- There are additional fees for white water rafting and Kodiak training.
- Participant meals include dinner Sunday night through breakfast on Friday (departure day). Lunch on arrival day is not provided.
- Staff arrival day varies depending upon position.

Rules for Unit Reservations:

- The unit contact must complete the registration for everyone in their unit. This contact must be a current member of the BSA and have a valid BSA membership number.
- There is no minimum or maximum group size, but all Youth Protection and Guide to Safe Scouting standards must be met. <u>https://www.scouting.org/health-and-safety/gss/gss01/</u>.


